

BOKS is coming

We are excited to announce that BOKS (Building Our Kids Success) is returning to the Hanlon School this winter!! BOKS is an early morning exercise program for children sponsored by Reebok. BOKS prepares students for a day of learning and is an important step in helping children appreciate the benefits of exercise and healthy choices that will last a lifetime. BOKS was inspired by the book "Spark" by Dr. John Ratey of Harvard Medical School. Several studies establish that moderate to vigorous physical activity stimulates brain function and creates the physiological conditions for students to be ready to learn. Grades 3-5 will meet on Wednesdays from 7:45am-8:30am, and K-2 will be on Thursdays from 7:45am-8:30am in the Hanlon gymnasium. The session will run for eight weeks from the week of January 29th through the week of March 27th. The cost to participate is \$15.00 per student for the session.

Sign-ups will open on Tuesday, Jan 9th at 8PM. Students will be accepted on a first-come, first-served, basis. The pre-registration form "timestamps" entries to ensure fairness. If your child is accepted, you will receive an email confirmation with a detailed registration form that you must fill out and return by the deadline listed.

Cold Weather

Now that the cold weather has arrived, I'd like to share a few reminders. Children play outside on the playground before school and at lunch recess, unless the temperature is below 20 degrees, or raining hard. It is important to make sure children are properly dressed for the weather, and this is especially important for students who walk to school, or who wait at the bus stop.

Winter jackets, hats, and mittens are appropriate for cold days. Sweatshirts, fleeces, and light jackets that are worn inside will not keep children warm enough to prevent

cold injury. Please be sure your child has the correct clothing so that recess can be enjoyed safely. Many children keep an extra pair of mittens stuffed inside a hat in their backpack just in case.

Remember to label everything with your child's name. Labeled clothing is always returned to children when it arrives in Lost and Found. If you need assistance with financing winter gear, or you know of a family in need, please contact Mrs. Cronin. Financial assistance will be handled respectfully and confidentially.
