1. Inclusive School Committee

Inclusive School Committee: Laura Cavanagh—Discussed progress of group—2 meetings.

Our role is to develop foundation to be able to help children express thoughts, share ideas, etc.

- 1. Book selections to be read aloud in each classroom –books focus on inclusion.
- 2. Open Circle activity –discussion around prompt "I feel included when."...then turned into paper chain, linking classes and whole school.
- 3. Mixing up groups of students at snack and or lunch periodically during the school year.

Beth Kelly suggested guest speakers, PTO involvement.

Jason Hatcher discussed model of parent diversity committee that could include guest speakers and reading/discussing books on diversity issues. Potentially monthly meetings.

- -suggested also that articles, news pieces, etc. could be used to generate discussion at these meetings.
- -Suggested to connect with PTO to coordinate Parent Diversity group.

1. Update on Room Parent Document

Jen Atkins wrote a Room Parent 101 document draft, will share with Sarah Cronin.

Document outlines roles of Room Parents and emphasizes that working parents can be Room Parents (can coordinate outside school time and recruit parents to attend parties).

Sarah suggested that teachers could individualize Room Parent document by grade level.

Purpose of Site Council

The School Site Council was first formed in 1993 in accordance with M.G.L. ch.71 §59C. It is a representative, school-based committee composed of the principal, parents, teachers, and community members. The law outlines four major areas of responsibility for councils. School councils assist principals in: Adopting educational goals for the school that are consistent with local educational policies and statewide student performance standards, identifying the educational needs of students attending the school, reviewing the annual school building budget, and discussing a school improvement plan.

Norms (adopted in 2014)

- Assume best intentions: We're all here for the good of the students and to make Hanlon a great place to learn
- Value diverse points of view: Gently push back when questions arise. A variety of opinions makes us a stronger group.
- Co-chairs will limit time for each topic
- Be professional
