Last Call - Class Placement - In May, teachers, special educators, specialists, the school psychologist, and I will begin the process of class placement for the 2019-2020 school year. We review information about each child's academic, social, and personal characteristics and use that information when making placement decisions. Our primary goal is to develop well-balanced classrooms and assign each child to a classroom in which he or she can develop academically and socially. I am confident that all of our teachers provide students with wonderful learning opportunities. If you have specific information about your child's learning needs that you would like us to consider during the process, please email me that information **by April 30th**. Only information provided to me, in writing, will be considered. Conversations with teachers during conferences, requests from previous years, and information from prior conversations are difficult to keep track of and not considered in the placement process. Please note that letters and emails are not kept from previous years since children change and grow and we make decisions based on current information. I will copy all letters and emails I receive and distribute them to the placement team members for consideration. If you are the parent of multiples (twins, triplets, etc.), you may specify whether you want your children placed in the same class or different classes. Please don't assume we know this information, if you have a preference for together or separate for your twin/triplet placement, let us know. **Westwood Public Schools does not allow parents to request their children's teachers; therefore, requests for specific teachers will not be accepted or considered. Specific requests to have a teacher will not be honored and will result in your child not being placed in the requested class.** Sometimes, parents assume that if one of their children had a teacher, the other child will automatically have that same teacher. This is not true. Previous family placements are not considered in the placement process. All class placements are final. Please contact me if you have any questions about the process.



Westwood Public Schools is Rocking [The Stock Market Game](#): Six of our students have been invited to Fidelity in Boston to celebrate their success as the top winners in the *Stock Market Game*! All of our 5th grade students participate in the *Stock Market Game*, investing a hypothetical \$100,000 in stocks and funds to build a virtual portfolio. The students participate under the supervision of teachers Mr. Goguen, Mr. Bartlett Ms. Reed, and Mr. Parkhurst.

The *Stock Market Game* is funded by SIFMA (Securities Industries and Financial Markets Association) and allows all students to participate at no cost. 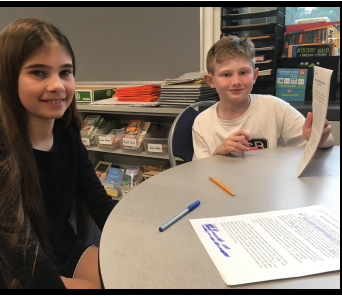
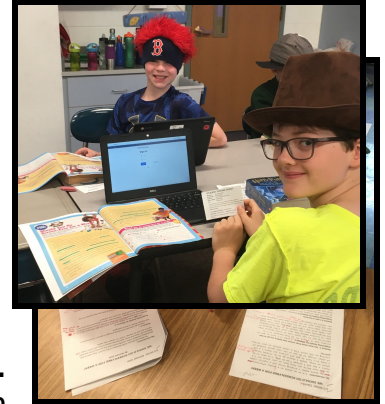
Classroom Happenings

News from 40 (Ms. O'Toole) 4-0 Goes Screen-Free



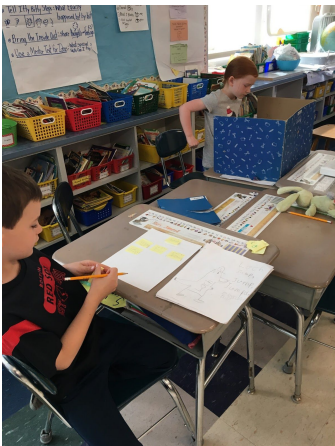
Thanks to our Storyworks magazine, my 4-0 Writers and I learned that next week, the week of April 29th, is **Screen-Free Week**. Students were asked to take a side on the debate posed in the question: **Should you go screen-free for a week?** Seldom do I tell my students which side of a debate to take, but in this assignment I did!

The first thing we did was to brainstorm a number of screens we use in and out of school. Our list was impressive! We then thought about what we could do instead of screen time. 4-0 writers shared the negative effects of too much screen time: loss of sleep, lack of exercise, weight gain, too much "alone" time, less face time in real time, loss of social skills, problems with eyesight, loss of attention, less family time, less reading time, and a person can lose his/her own creativity and "smartness." After this discussion, 4-0 Writers wrote persuasive essays to convince their readers to go screen-free next week. 4-0 writers developed at least three reasons why less screen time is important. Writing partners helped each other elaborate on each reason, adding more supporting details, personal experiences and descriptions.

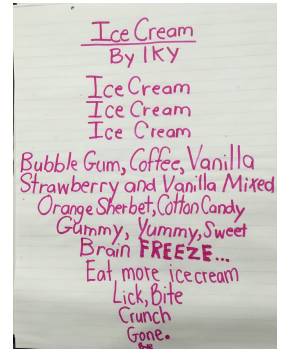
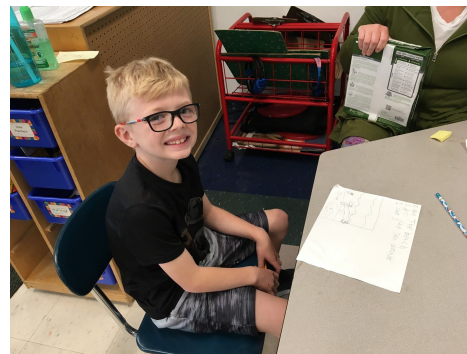

News from 1K (Mrs. Kyvelos)



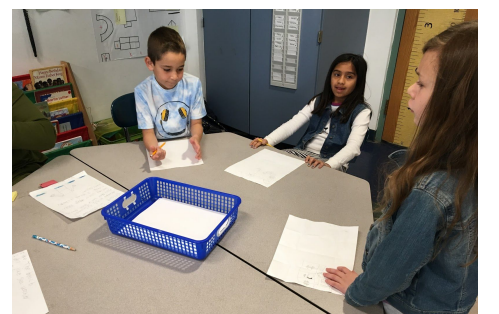

In celebration of Earth Day, students worked on the concept of "point of view" in the Learning Center. Students in grades three and four read **The Great Kapok Tree** and were tasked to discuss the different points of view of the animals impacted by the humans who have entered the rainforest in order to cut down the kapok tree—a tree on which the animals depend. After ascertaining the main idea of the story, the students worked to identify and organize relevant, supporting details into a chart for reference and then worked together to develop a cohesive essay given the writing prompt, "Using the points of view of different animals, discuss why they do not want the kapok tree cut down." The students took turns verbalizing their written notes into full, grammatically correct sentences and practiced the skills of incorporating transitional words/phrases, using direct quotations as evidence to support the main idea and elaborating to explain.

What's Happening in Physical Education

Over the past several weeks the Martha Jones students have been participating in an educational gymnastics unit. The children spent the first few weeks working on a variety of floor skills in the areas of: traveling, balancing and rolling. The second part of the unit focused on the gymnastics equipment structure.



Gymnastic activities are a very important part of every child's experience in physical education and make a significant contribution to the goals of the curriculum. Gymnastics encompasses a variety of components such as rolling, balancing, weight transfer and traveling on different body parts and equipment.



Participating in gymnastic activities teaches and promotes important physical values. These activities help develop muscular strength, muscular endurance, flexibility, coordination, as well as gross motor development and body control. The physical demands of holding balances, rolling, and traveling contribute to the development of overall physical fitness.
