-Laura and others created an “inclusive book list” posted to Hanlon school website on Principal Post.

-Next week will begin one of several Mix It Up At Lunch days. Teachers paired students with others who they don’t normally sit next to. They will be given conversation starters to get to know each other. Want to help kids break out of their comfort zones. Teachers have the option of doing this at snack time as well.

1. Update from Parent Inclusion Seed Group- Mandy

Created out of interest from Hanlon Site Council parents and community action group (not necessarily a Hanlon Site Council initiative/document).

Goals:

- 1-inclusive school environment, welcoming all students
- 2-Educating students about diversity and interacting with others, understanding, discussing differences

Three things to consider:

1. Relevant in-school curriculum and classroom engagement

2. Inclusive school environment with common norms, language, guidelines
3. At-home engagement and support—at minimum parents would be aware of school's norms and expectations; ideally parents are supportive; potential for parents to engage more deeply

- Need to get some parents to take leads
 - Common norms/language –need parent and teacher input
 - Need to layout priorities and actions for parents
- Suggestions/Thoughts
-Specifics about common language and norms are helpful-to ease concerns/answer lingering questions
-How to respond to parental concerns or disagreement within school community around norms/language implemented
-Emphasize respecting all students and the rights that each has to be included and represented
-Pace

Purpose of Site Council

The School Site Council was first formed in 1993 in accordance with M.G.L. ch.71 §59C. It is a representative, school-based committee composed of the principal, parents, teachers, and community members. The law outlines four major areas of responsibility for councils. School councils assist principals in: Adopting educational goals for the school that are consistent with local educational policies and statewide student performance standards, identifying the educational needs of students attending the school, reviewing the annual school building budget, and discussing a school improvement plan.

Norms (adopted in 2014)

- Assume best intentions: We're all here for the good of the students and to make Hanlon a great place to learn
- Value diverse points of view: Gently push back when questions arise. A variety of opinions makes us a stronger group.
- Co-chairs will limit time for each topic
- Be professional
- Maintain positive and productive communication with the school community
- Respect confidentiality of students, families, and staff during all discussions
